In June we organized a walk in the scenic Karura Forest, and the event's success was made possible by the generosity of our donors. With a turnout of nearly 350 walkers, the event themed "Make a Difference One Step at a Time", raised funds to support our Education Fund Program. Our event's main sponsor, Sachit Shah from GA Assurance, graced the occasion by addressing the participants and flagging off the walkers. Before embarking on their walks, participants enjoyed an energetic warm-up to lively dance music, and they were free to cover distances of their choosing. Additionally, the students of Oshwal Academy went above and beyond in their efforts to raise funds for less privileged students and actively participated in the walk.

The event took place at PINS Bowling and raised funds for our Feeding Program and Water Projects. The lively competition among the 360 participants sparked countless moments of laughter and served as a fantastic chance for teams to bond and build connections.



Construction and Upgrades

Mitaboni Training College

One of the highlights of this year was the completion of a significant infrastructure upgrade at Mitaboni Training College, our very first undertaking at a technical and vocation college. With the support of our donors we constructed two new ablution blocks, refurbished three classrooms and three workshops, and repurposed a hall into a dormitory for the girls, thereby improving the facilities for our students.









Utangwa Youth Polytechnic

We also extended our support to the Utangwa Youth Polytechnic, where we facilitated soft upgrades to their tailoring and hairdressing classrooms, ensuring students have access to quality training facilities.

We encouraged the college to involve the students in the upgrade project so that they would take ownership and have a sense of pride and responsibility for caring for the upgraded facilities

The carpentry students made beds, built the shelves, counter tops and worktables for the tailoring and hairdressing departments from scratch. They also repainted the exterior of the building and classrooms thereby allowing our limited budget to stretch further while at the same time putting into practice their carpentry and masonry skills.

Education Fund Program

Our program continues to impact lives of disadvantaged youth and this year we enrolled 21 students into secondary school for four years and 36 students into various technical colleges.







Our First Graduating Class

2023 marked a significant milestone for us, as we celebrated with 29 students who completed their TVET courses. We held our first graduation event to honor their achievement and celebrate their success. It was heartening to see firsthand the transformation of these young adults from shy timid individuals into confident young people with a promising future.

For many of these students, they are the first in their family to go to college or even complete four years of secondary school.

We were equally excited to participate in an event, themed "Understanding the Journey", held at the I&M Foundation offices, for 20 of our scholarship students who are recipients of scholarships made possible by their generosity. Witnessing the profound impact that education has on these young minds is a privilege and knowing we are changing their lives is humbling.



In October, we attended the official graduation ceremony of two of students at St. Kizito Vocational Training Institute. We watched with immense pride as Kelvin Mutuku and Grace Onyango received their certificates.





This is what Kelvin had to say:

"Good morning. I thank the Lord for this far that we have reached and also thanks so much Amara Charitable Trust for helping me to achieve this level where I am today. Am so happy. When I was in high school I wanted to be an engineer in plumbing, so I used to go for construction (mjengo) and I was good at it. No one forced me to go, I was just willing to do it. I'm thankful so, so much to you all. Now I am in Narok county doing a plumbing job for my former high school teacher. Last week I went one of teachers took me to install water tanks on her farm."



Other Initiatives to Promote Learning

Gulf Power, a potential partner hosted four of our students at their power plant in September. It was an educative and eye-opening visit for our students studying electrical installation







Feedback from *Brian Nzomo*, who studied Electrical Wireman:

"I feel blessed to have this opportunity from Amara because of the way you show confidence in me which is so inspiring. Also I thank the entire team of Gulf Power for giving us a chance to have a visit and learn more about power generation."

Farming and Gardening visits



We arranged visits for our head teachers, technical college students studying General Agriculture and secondary school students to see working farms and learn about good farming practices.

Royal Seed Africa, hosted 15 students from Kanaani Secondary Girls and Introduced them to basic crop management and irrigation methods.





At Plant Raisers, five of our 5 general agriculture students and teachers from Ngalalya and Kwa Mboo Primary Schools were excited to see modern farming methods and learn about different varieties of crops and seeds suitable for their individual regions.

Our feeding program

Now in its 10th year, the feeding program continues to impact the lives of 5,820 young learners across 7 primary schools. Our ability to sustain this program is totally dependent on our incredible donors. We are unfortunately facing the daunting decision to cut back on the number of days we can continue providing a hot meal to the schools.







School Support





We were fortunate to receive over 12,000 story and reference books this year from generous donors. Thanks to them we have 17 fully stocked libraries in all the schools we support. Encouraging a reading culture has never been more important at this point in time considering all the distractions youth have to deal with.

We also received donations of exercise books, school furniture, geometrical sets and other school stationery. All of these donations go a long way towards enhancing learning and improving the students' literacy.

Menstrual Health Workshops

This year, we conducted two interactive menstrual health and pad-making workshops as part of our ongoing efforts to combat period poverty within underserved communities.

These workshops involved local stakeholders and aimed to challenge cultural norms that hinder women's progress while empowering the young girls and women through education, awareness, and community involvement.

The workshops successfully engaged with 230 girls on menstrual health talks and trained 33 mothers in pad-making.









We also gifted the school and the Maasai women's group with a sewing machine each. The Maasai women were trained to use the sewing machine and we are encouraging them to set up a small business enterprise and work towards their financial independence.

To increase awareness of cultural practices that hinder women's progress, we proactively arranged a session with students from Najile Boys Secondary School.

The objective of the discussion was to impart life skills, educate them about the risks associated with alcohol and drug abuse, and demonstrate how cultural practices and traditions can be thoughtfully incorporated into their daily lives.



Utangwa Youth Polytechnic

The institution is growing and the existing facilities are fast becoming insufficient to support the student population adequately. We have pledged to raise funds to facilitate an upgrade which will include, two ablution blocks, classrooms/workshops, dining hall and kitchen.

Ngwata Primary School

This project will be a major undertaking. Our plan is to decongest the school which will mean constructing facilities on a new site neighbouring the existing school. Earlier this year the Amara Trustees met with the County Governor to discuss the allocation of the land.

School Playgrounds

Our vision is to create a holistic learning experience for the young learners in the primary schools we support and in 2024 we are planning to create and equip playgrounds in 2 primary schools. The estimated cost of setting up a playground with slides, swings and merry-go-rounds is KShs 500,000.

Education Fund Program

Enroll 50 new students to the Education Fund Program in 2024. This will be made up of both secondary school and technical college students and continue to support existing students.

Feeding Program

Continue with our feeding program in the 7 primary schools we currently support. The number of students we support continues to grow each year and we expect that 2024 will see an increase in the student population.

While our upcoming endeavours may appear ambitious to some, we remain absolutely confident that they will come to fruition, all thanks to our extraordinary donors who continue to share our vision and trust us with their unwavering support.









We look back on our accomplishments with immense appreciation, and extend our heartfelt thanks to all of you who share in our mission to educate, empower, and enhance the lives of marginalized youth.
